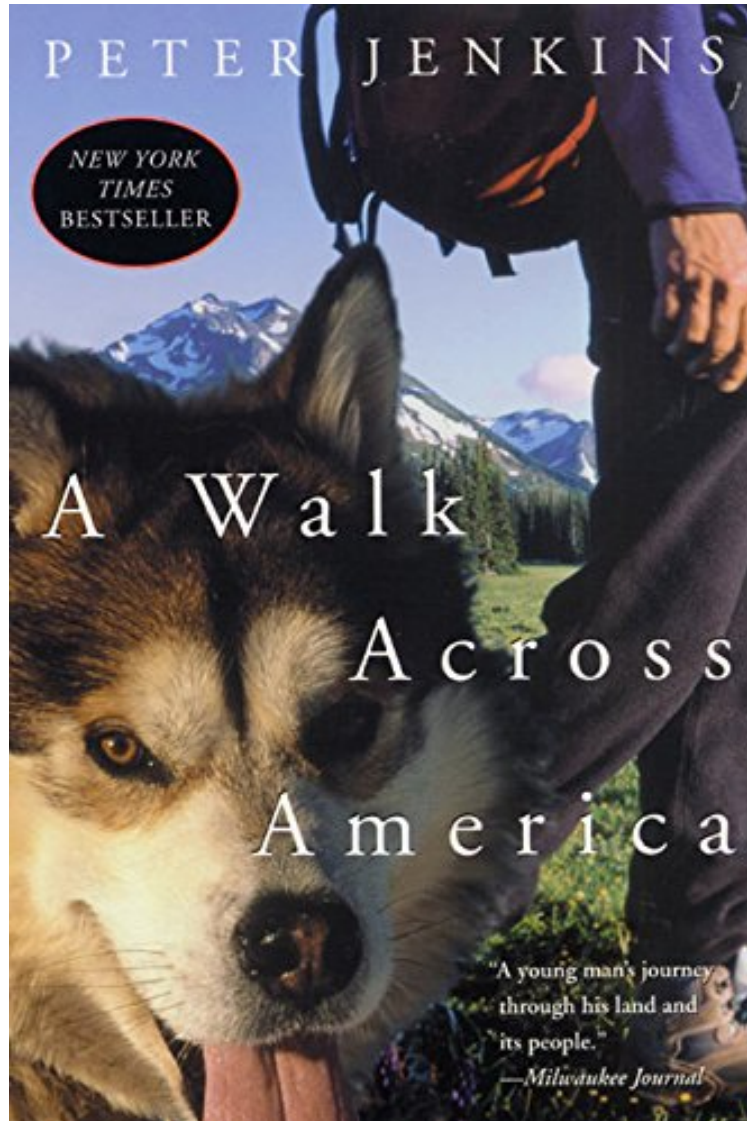

Peter Jenkins' wife and walking partner, Barbara, is a strong writer and I sometimes enjoyed her descriptions more than his. She is billed as co-author of The Walk West but only wrote about 20 percent of the story. Her sensitive contributions balance out her husband's often rough details and gruff dialogue. I feel this book could have been about 100 pages

shorter. By the time they got to Idaho, I skipped ahead to the end. Overall, though, I was riveted in many places and felt sad whenever Peter mentioned his beloved dog, Cooper, who was his best buddy in *A Walk Across America*.
