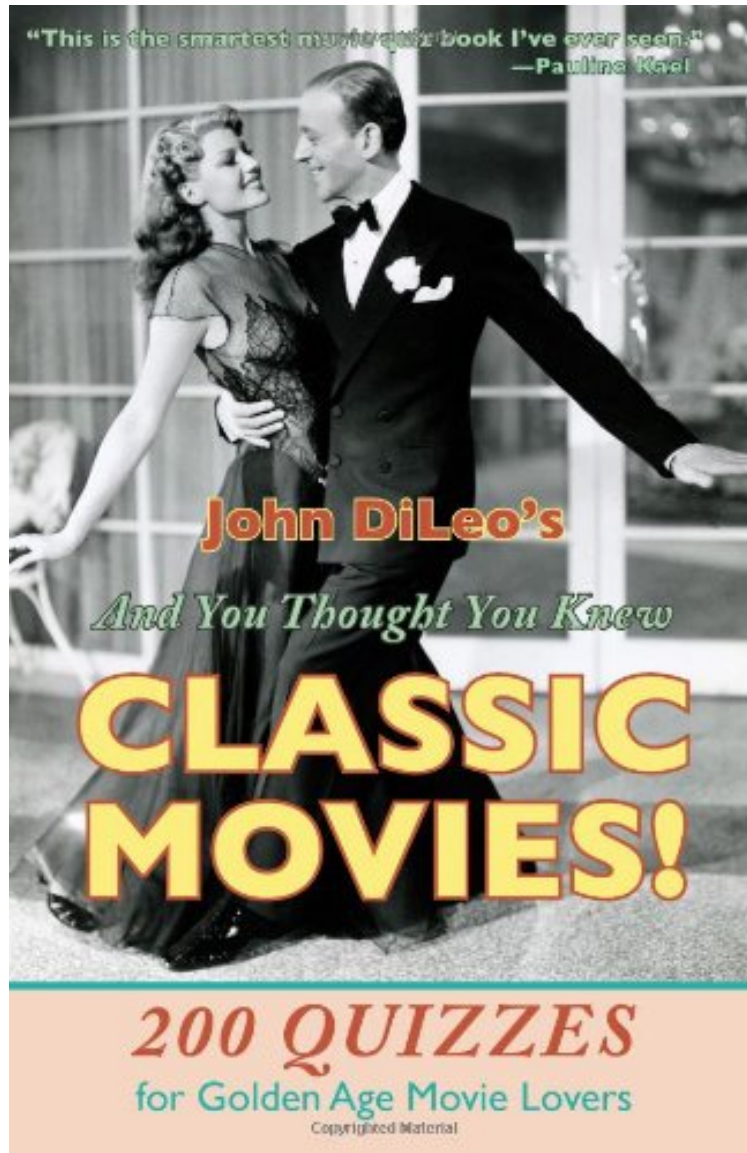

(St. Martin's, 1999; Hansen Publishing Group, 2013), hailed by Pauline Kael as "the smartest movie quiz book I've ever seen." His second book was 100 Great Film Performances You Should Remember But Probably Don't (Limelight Editions, 2002), which Adolph Green called "a valuable and touching work."
