There's something about ScottBy JanetI read a lot of celebrity autobiographies and memoirs because I've found that they are the one genre my ESL students uniformly love to read, and I like to be able to recommend appropriate titles. This is the first such book I've felt inclined to write a review

for. First of all, I'm not exactly in Scott's target market. I'm more of the listener that gets him called "the housewife's favorite." I really enjoy his podcast and I respect that he is open about his social anxiety and sexuality without relying on them to be the gimmick of his on-air personality. He's fun and funny, but there's always something vulnerable about Scott. I think that's why women adore him. A lot of this book is a repeat from his show, but with more details and names. It's enjoyable and light in the same way his show is. What sets this apart from other celeb books is the times he lets you peak into his personal life, from coming out to his parents, to his almost crippling anxiety issues, to the death of his live-in boyfriend. The thing is, he doesn't roll around in those memories or even blame them for his setbacks. Even the drinking and subsequent on-air drunk episode that followed his boyfriend's death -- he doesn't tell them as if looking for your pity. When writing about mental illness, he explains that he doesn't want other people to feel embarrassed or ashamed, and that seems to penetrate so many of his stories. He's done dumb things, just like everyone has. He's gone through hard times, just like everyone. He's not ashamed of who he is. For long time listeners, there are some inside jokes and also some clarifications -- especially regarding his relationship with his flatmate of 11 years, Fraser. Am I the only one surprised by that revelation? Expect some stuff you've heard, and some stuff you've heard told in more detail (the Uganda documentary, the desert trek, the Fringe Festival). This was a good read and I will definitely use it with some of my students, especially those who are shy or struggling with peer acceptance. Go on, Pigs!

He is the most popular DJ that currently plays on the air in the UK. His style is family friendly. His relationship with his producer and co-stars is genuine and not just coworkers thrown together at a job. This book tells the journey that Scott Mills took from childhood to BBC Radio 1. It is a peek into the life of UK's most beloved DJ. Some autobiography's delve too much into their personal lives in my opinion and really give us the dirt. Scott knows how to be open and honest with his readers while at the same time keeping just enough details to himself to retain his privacy. It is an enjoyable read that I read in one sitting! I enjoyed it all, from his tales of hanging out with David "the Hoff" Hasselhoff to his relationship with his long-suffering housemate and best friend, Fraser.
